Types of Clinical Experiences



Types of Clinical Experiences (PA)

Patient Care Experience

- Hands-On Patient Interaction
- Playing a *direct* part in the treatment of a patient
- Usually paid, can be volunteer

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Many school require min.
 1000 hours

Health Care Experience

- Any other health-related
 experience
 - Not directly responsible for the treatment of patients
- Clerical work, healthcare volunteering, HRIs, etc
- Usually no min. hour requirement

Hour Conversions

- 1 year working full time = ~2000 hours
- 1 year working part time = ~1000 hours
- 2 years working full time = ~4000 hours
- The more hours, the more competitive

Certification Jobs

- Emergency Medical Technician (EMT)
 - Emergency Department Technician (ED Tech)
- Certified Nurse Assistant (CNA)
- Medical Assistant (MA)***
- Phlebotomist
- EKG Technician***



Emergency Medical Technician (EMT)

- Provide out of hospital emergency medical care and transportation for critical and emergent patients
- Stabilize patients, take vitals, administer certain medications, take medical history/assessments, practice BLS interventions, assist paramedic with treatments (IV, Ventilators, EKG, etc)
- <u>Course:</u> 4-16 weeks
 - UCDFD: EMT 110/111 over Fall/Winter/Spring/Summer
- <u>Cost:</u> \$800 \$2000
- <u>Test:</u> National Registry of Emergency Medical Technicians (NREMT)
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Emergency Department Technician (ED Tech)



- EMT in Emergency Department: Taking vitals, splint/bandage wounds, run/read EKGs, assist MD/PA/RN with basic treatments, work traumas/codes
- Most ED jobs require either an EMT or CNA license (phlebotomy is a plus)



Phlebotomist

- Perform blood draws, injections, and calms down patients
- Works in a hospital (inpatient/outpatient) or clinic setting
- Can work for companies such as Vitalant
- <u>Course:</u> 2-8 weeks
- <u>Cost:</u> \$1500 \$3000
- <u>Certification</u>: Phlebotomy Technician Certification





Certified Nurse Assistant (CNA)

- Feed/bathe patients, take vitals, distribute medications, assist RNs with basic procedures
- Can work in a hospital/clinic/nursing home/senior care center
- <u>Course:</u> 6-12 weeks
- <u>Cost:</u> \$800 \$1500
- <u>Certification Test</u>: National Nurse Aide Assessment Program (NNAAP)



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EKG Technician***



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- Apply 12-Lead EKG, print and analyze EKG rhythms
- No national certification
- Usually people are EKG Technicians in addition to being a CNA/MA/EMT/etc

Medical Assistant***



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- Take vitals, get patient history, prep patients for procedures
 - May perform blood draws, injections, skin biopsies
- Complete administrative and clinical tasks in the offices of physicians, hospitals, and other healthcare facilities
- Course: 4-12 months
 - Employers may hire *without* certification
- <u>Cost:</u> varies

Shadowing Experience

- Officially following and observing a PA/MD/NP/etc.
- Purely observational, no hands-on experience
- Contact family/friends or ask PCP
- Cold call/email private practices/clinics/urgent cares
- Call & set up a time to chat about the _____ profession
 - Things to ask:
 - What made you choose the ____ profession?
 - What made you choose the ____ specialty?
 - Where do you/would you like to see the _____ field go?

• At the end, ask them if they or anyone they know will take shadowing students UCDAVIS HEALTH PROFESSIONS ADVISING

Student-Run Clinics

• Work with medical professionals (MD/DO/PA) and students to

provide care to underserved communities

- Take vitals, history, assist with procedures, run labs, etc.
- 11 SRC under UCDMC
- Applications: Fall/Spring
- Competitive
- Prior experience not required
- Can split into PCE/HCE**
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Health-Related Internships

- Hospital Volunteer in different departments
 - Good for networking/Shadowing/seeing how a hospital is run
- 4-8 Hrs/Week for 1-2 quarters
- Mostly HCE
